INNIS ARDEN BOARD MEETING – June 14, 2011

The June 14, 2011 Board meeting was called to order by President Mike Jacobs at 7:06 PM. Board members present: Kathi Peterson, Harley O'Neil, Pat French, Dave Fosmire, Sue Cox, Bob Allen, Scott Reid and Mike Jacobs. Absent: Ken Beres

The minutes of the May 10, 2011 Board meeting were approved as published in the Bulletin.

PRESIDENT, Mike Jacobs – Mark Relph was to speak on the Storm Creek matter but his presentation has been postponed to our August meeting when he'll have more information to report.

The hearing on the Bear Reserve appeal will be on June 21, 2011 at 9 AM at Shoreline City Hall. An organization named "Friends of Bear Reserve," comprised of persons who live within and outside of Innis Arden and whose registered agent is John Hushagen, hired attorney David Bricklin to file a motion to intervene in the Bear Reserve appeal matter to assist the City in defending against the Club's appeal. The Club's attorney, Peter Eglick, was successful in obtaining an order from the hearing examiner denying the intervention on the grounds that it was untimely. The intervention would have substantially increased the Club's legal fees.

No decision has been received from Judge Rogers in the Tronsen II case.

VICE PRESIDENT, Dave Fosmire – The Compliance Committee (Harley O'Neil, Pat French, Bob Allen and Dave Fosmire) were called to meet regarding the Martsof vs Rusch petition and determined there was sufficient basis to hold a hearing. A motion carried to refer the matter to the Board at a Compliance Hearing on July 13th.

TREASURER, Pat French -- For the period ending 5/31/2011, our cash comprised of \$264,004 with liabilities of \$1,700. Overall, the spending to date is within budget, with no unusual expenses paid in May. There is about \$13,000 owing for 2011 dues.

BUILDING & REMODELING, Bob Allen -- There are no applications to consider at this meeting. Letters have been sent to the last three applicants regarding the covenant requirements pertaining to construction time and other matters.

Scott suggested extending the construction period from 8 months to a longer period of time. Mike explained that any change to the covenants would require the 2/3rd affirmative vote of all shareholders and all voting signatures must be notarized.

The following is a copy of the letter Bob has prepared to be sent to all future Building & Remodel applicants when their applications are approved reminding them of time limits according to the Covenants and *The Homeowners' Guide for Remodels and New Construction, Conditions*, which

reads as follows:

"Congratulations on getting Board approval for your Building and Remodel application (date of approval). As stated in the *Homeowner's Guide for Remodels and New Construction, Conditions*, this approval is good for **one year** from the approval date. If the project is not begun within the year the project must be resubmitted for Board approval.

"According to the Covenants, all exterior construction, including exterior clean-up, must be completed within **eight (8) months** from the date it is commenced. The Board will consider circumstances beyond the owner's control before granting an extension to this deadline. Homeowners who fail to meet this deadline will be subject to Board action.

"When the project has received final approval of the Shoreline Building Department the homeowner will provide a copy of the signed **approval** document to the Building and Remodels Chairman.

"Homeowners are responsible for making contractors and others aware of all of the *Conditions*, including no advertising **signs** on the building site, structure or adjacent street right-of-way during and after the construction period.

"On behalf of your Innis Arden neighbors, thank you for respecting these Conditions."

CLUBHOUSE, Harley O'Neil -- In May, the clubhouse received \$4,100 in rental income and \$400 from a redeposit of an NSF check for a total of \$4,500 in revenue. We refunded \$875.00 in deposit reimbursements. May was a busy month with a baptismal party, birthday party, a wedding, a weekend long estate sale and several community and committee meetings. Harley reported he is continuing to look into ways to reduce the noise from the Clubhouse into the community, but it is thought the noise issue with some Clubhouse neighbors is the result of the front doors being open during events. Future users will be requested to keep those doors closed.

The word is getting out that the Innis Arden Clubhouse is a great venue for weddings, receptions, birthday parties, and special family events. If your home is too small to reunite with family members, consider renting the clubhouse.

Harley further reported that the Clubhouse committee is \$5,000 over budgeted income, after expenses.

Harley suggested using the Clubhouse for a get-together of the Shoreline City Council candidates, at the invitation of the Board, and he'll look into setting up the gathering on a date when all or most candidates would be available.

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ACTIVITIES, Ken Beres – (In Ken's absence, his report was read by Sue.) Not much is happening in the summer with Activity events, but I'll remind everyone of the 4-Corners BrewFest on Saturday, August 13, 3-7 PM at the IA clubhouse. Tickets can now also be purchased online at Brown Paper Tickets and from Beach House Gift Shop. We are looking for four Innis Arden volunteers to take tickets, provide security, work in the kitchen or help with clean up. Please call Ken Beres (206-801-7234) if you are interested. Shifts will be two hours for the event so it will provide time for volunteers to join in the tasting. Tickets are \$30 per person; the price includes ten five-ounce beers to taste and plenty of food.

Speaking of volunteers, the activities committee is still looking for chairpersons for both the Salmon BBQ and the Holiday Party. No experience is required. Interested individuals can call Randi Fattizzi for information.

Lastly, the Activities Committee feels strongly about the completion of the basketball courts and walking path at the clubhouse and encourages the board to push forward with this project this summer.

GROUNDS, Kathi Peterson -- Regular maintenance continues on the clubhouse grounds, four minor entrances and Springdale Triangle. The landscapers are also doing some minimal weed control and basic clean up at the main entrance as needed. The irrigation system at the main entrance was tested this week and all the sprinkler heads are functioning properly. Fortunately the ground is still wet under the 4-6" of wood chips recently spread which hopefully will keep our irrigation costs this year as low as possible.

Warren Anderson from Tri-Terra is ready to begin resurfacing the basketball court and walking pathway and taking down six trees whose roots are buckling the current asphalt along 15th Ave. N.W. We haven't scheduled him to work yet because of Club financial concerns and because of adverse winter and spring weather conditions. As we see the weather and Club's budget forecast improve, the Board plans on proceeding with this work.

It was agreed the budget already covered the expense of this project and that the committee can proceed when weather permits.

ENTRANCE COMMITTEE, reported by Jean Muir -- The Innis Arden Entrance Committee met on Sunday, June 5 from 3 – 5:30 (approximately) on the Clubhouse patio. Amely Wurmbbrand, Al Wagar, Rick Leary, John Hushagen, June Howard, Jean Muir, Ian Walker, and Robert Allen and Judy Allen (for part of the meeting) were present.

We had an excellent discussion of the proposals which had been reviewed at the previous meeting. After further discussion and consideration of the proposals submitted, we decided that we would like to select one or two vendors from each category - landscape design and signage - for further review. The landscape designers identified were

Edmonds Landscaping and Kate Norgaard from Metamorphosis. The signage vendor identified was Studio 23 Metal Company. The arbor work could be done by either the landscaper or the signage vendor.

The estimated cost of planting plans from the landscape vendors ranges from \$2500 to \$5000 for the planting plan without any installation or signage fees. This amount would be taken from the amount already budgeted and approved for the entrance design in 2011.

In addition to the vendors identified, the group agreed that we would also like to meet with Jeremy Reding of Boxwood to understand further the concepts which govern the design he created for the entrance. Members of the committee offered to underwrite this meeting with personal contributions of \$150. The intent was not to have Jeremy make the formal presentation with the power point slides which he proposed for \$500, but to meet with him informally to review the design already created, ask questions, and further understand the conceptual basis of the design. Jean Muir, working with June Howard, was asked to contact Jeremy to see if he would be willing to meet with the group. He will be meeting with us on June 20th at 7 PM.

The group agreed on the following next procedures/steps:

1. Request approval from the Board at the next meeting (June 14) to spend between \$2500 and \$5000 in 2011 to have the vendor selected develop a planting plan (see step 4). Funds to develop a signage design will be requested later this year although it would be good to have a signage design done in the same time frame as the planting plan so that they are harmonious.

The committee feels that it would be inappropriate to ask the vendors to do additional work this year unless we have a commitment from the Board for funds to do at least the planting plan and sign design work. The committee would hope to have some planting done in fall, 2011 with the rest done in 2012 and the signage in 2012 or later as funds are available and approved. No funds will be spent until the vendors are recommended to the Board and Board approval has been obtained.

2. Request that each vendor, including Jeremy, provide one or two locations where members of the committee could see a fully grown-in landscape and/or signage designed by the vendor. Committee members complete site visits. Al Wagar will coordinate.

3. Invite the vendors to meet with the committee and any interested community members for a fuller discussion of their proposal and work.

4. The Committee will recommend one vendor for the planting plan and one for the signage to the Board for approval of the vendor and approval to move forward with the design.

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5. Companies selected will meet with the committee for information and input. Interested community members would be welcome to the meeting.

6. The signage person selected and committee members will meet with the City of Shoreline representatives to clarify any applicable city requirements before design work begins.

7. Conceptual designs are prepared with 2 – 3 options for the planting and the signage. Designs will include an overall estimate of installation costs.

8. Designs are reviewed by the committee. At that meeting, interested community members would be welcome to review the designs and comment after they are reviewed by the committee. A well-publicized community meeting would then be held to obtain additional comment after which the committee will review all comments and select a preferred alternative.

9. Construction documents are developed reflecting the preferred planting plan and signage and arbor alternatives. Construction documents will include more detailed cost estimates for plants, installation and signage. Landscape documents will indicate which segments should be planted together and which could be delayed for budget purposes.

10. The committee returns to the Board with the construction documents, budget, and timeline and requests Board approval to proceed.

A motion was made by Kathi Peterson, seconded by Scott Reid, that the Innis Arden Board approves the expenditure of up to \$5,000 in 2011 by the Innis Arden Entrance Committee for a planting plan for the Innis Arden Entrance. Payment will be authorized once the vendor is recommended to the Board by the Committee and approved by the Board, and the plan is submitted and approved by the Committee. The motion passed with 4 yes and 3 no votes.

Kathi Peterson moved that the Innis Arden Board approve the expenditure of up to \$2,000 in 2011 by the Innis Arden Entrance Committee for a signage and trellis/arbor design for the Innis Arden Entrance. Payment will be authorized once the vendor is recommended to the Board by the Committee and approved by the Board, and the plan is submitted and approved by the Committee. It is agreed that if the Committee determines that the trellis/arbor design is better done by the vendor for the planting plan, some of these funds, upon approval by the Board, may be applied to the work by the planting plan vendor. The motion was seconded and passed with 5 yes votes and 3 no votes.

RESERVES, Scott Reid -- All hazardous trees approved by the city in Eagle and Boeing Creek were removed or snagged between June 2 and 6. The Board needs to consider whether to re-open Eagle and Boeing Creek. Bear

still contains known hazardous trees. **It was moved by Sue Cox, seconded by Harley O' Neil, to reopen Eagle and Boeing Creek Reserves with posted warning signs regarding the possible presence of dangerous trees. The motioned passed unanimously.**

There was a Reserves Committee meeting on May 26th. We discussed the requirements for hiring crews to remove invasive species and scope of work. The first priority is to perform routine trail maintenance, which is mostly mowing the grass/weeds along both sides of the trails. Work has begun but there is more to do. Possible future projects were discussed.

There was a work party on Saturday June 4th in Running Water. We had a very small turnout but we were able to mulch the recently planted saplings, prune and remove debris, and take out a big section of English ivy near the West entrance. Thanks to Rick Leary, John Hushagen, Steve Johnston, and Bob Phelps.

Upcoming items:

The gravel fill in the steps at the south end of the Blue Heron bridge has washed out and need to be re-filled. A city approved Arborist is scheduled for June 17th to inspect hazardous trees in Bear, Grouse, Running Water, Blue Heron, and three trees in Eagle. There are currently 20 total trees that are of concern.

Maggie Taber is donating trees and plants that will be planted in the Reserves, mostly in the fall. We will stage them until the wet season returns. The plants include 13 Pacific Rhodys, 6 Oregon Grape, 9 pots of native grasses, 32 Salal, 5 Rocky Mtn Juniper, 1 Ocean Spray, 1 Vine Maple, 3 Elderberry, 7 Snowberry, 2 Pink Snowberry, 17 Pacific Yew, 9 Evergreen Huckleberry, 5 Highbush Cranberry, 2 Mock Orange, 1 Sword Fern, 3 Red Twig Dogwood. Thank you Maggie!

COMMUNITY COMMENTS:

Dave inquired about the tree in Blue Heron Reserve, next to John Hushagen's property, which was cut down. Mr. Hushagen admitted to cutting down the maple tree hanging over his property, though he had no permits or permission from the City or Board to do so.

Mrs. Town reported that Frazer Cook has not yet done any of the required cutting on his property. The fines continue while his vegetation is not in compliance.

There will be a site inspection by the Board at the Wright property on Thursday, June 23, 5 PM.
